
Hogs in the Cornfield

GAME: Each student choses a partner. The pair decides who is number 1 and number 2. One or more pairs come to a line marked on the floor. They grasp each others' right hands and put their toes against the line while the class sings the song once. When the song is over each tries to pull his/her partner across the line. Whoever wins takes the loser over to their team. When everyone has had a turn, each team is counted, including the losers who have come from the other team. The team with most people wins.




